

# Faith Positive Relationships, Sex and Health Education

### What changes from 1 September 2020?

- Relationships Education is mandatory for primary schools – and parents do not have a right to withdraw their child
- Relationships and Sex Education is mandatory in secondary schools (including academies) – parents do have a right to withdraw their child from sex education
- Health education is mandatory for primary and secondary schools
- There is a greater emphasis on equalities legislation



#### What stays the same?

- A written policy is still required
- Schools must still develop and review that policy in consultation with parents
- The policy should still reflect the community the school serves

#### Religion or belief – a protected characteristic

- A good understanding of pupils' faith backgrounds and positive relationships between the school and local faith communities help to create a constructive context for the teaching of these subjects.
- In all schools, when teaching these subjects, the religious background of all pupils must be
  taken into account when planning teaching, so that the topics that are included in the core
  content in this guidance are appropriately handled. Schools must ensure they comply with the
  relevant provisions of the Equality Act 2010, under which religion or belief are amongst the
  protected characteristics.
- All schools may teach about faith perspectives. In particular, schools with a religious character
  may teach the distinctive faith perspective on relationships, and balanced debate may take place
  about issues that are seen as contentious. For example, the school may wish to reflect on faith
  teachings about certain topics as well as how their faith institutions may support people in
  matters of relationships and sex.


